### Cajsa Schumacher, Board Member

## **New Foundations**



## Have you heard about our New Foundations program?

New Foundations is an innovative, transitional living program for single parents and their children. The program is designed to move single parents out of a life of poverty and into a life of self-sufficiency and independence by giving them the tools they need to succeed. The program is operated out of two buildings in the village of Morrisville. We are able to serve five single-parent families who are homeless, at risk of becoming homeless, or struggle to remain adequately housed.

While in the New Foundations program, participants receive a furnished apartment for up to two years. During that time, participants do not pay rent but do pay into a savings account. We take the worry of housing off the table for our participants, allowing them to concentrate on improving their lives for themselves and their families.

We offer 1:1 guidance from our Program Manager to develop highly individualized goals, tailored to the needs, learning style, and capabilities of participants. Participants work on furthering their education whether a technical program, certificate or diploma. The participants are required to save up to 30% of their income, and participate in financial coaching which includes budgeting, improving monthly cash flow and addressing credit issues.

The short term change for New Foundations participants is stable housing, advancing their education, and providing educational opportunities for their children.

The long term change for New Foundations participants is living a life free of public assistance, higher earning power, landlord references and a break in the cycle of poverty.

United Way of Lamoille County (UWLC) owns a historic barn in downtown Morrisville. Through a blossoning partnership with Salvation Farms, it became clear that if renovated, this space could be used to improve community wide health. It is the perfect size to house the Salvation Farms Lamoille Valley Gleaning program, allowing the program to increase the amount of produce it handles and diversify their distribution methods.

Salvation Farms is a local non-profit dedicated to reducing food loss on farms and increasing the use of locally grown foods. Based on a 2016 study conducted by Salvation Farms, it was calculated that nearly 1 million pounds of edible produce is lost on Lamoille Valley farms annually; an area where roughly 12% of the population, or 6,000 individuals, are experiencing food insecurity. In response to this, Salvation Farms' Lamoille Valley Gleaning program serves the community by moving unsold produce from local farms to those who need it most: the young, the sick, the elderly, and those experiencing food insecurity. In 2018, this program gleaned more than 70,000 pounds of produce, logged over 900 volunteer hours, and served 31 recipient sites.

The UWLC's renovation will include reinforcing the existing structure and adding insulation, electricity and plumbing. Windows, doors, and interior stairs will be replaced and an ADA bathroom, waste oil furnace, and walk-in cooler will be added to the space. The second floor will be transformed into an office and meeting space; the first floor will house equipment and infrastructure for safe food handling and supply storage. The hope for this project is to increase food security in the Lamoille Valley, and will touch multiple organizations providing basic needs in Lamoille County.
